Our Environmental Roots



In September 2010, Newmarket opened the doors to its new 65,000 square-foot, environmentally-friendly Operations Centre. Built to Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver standards, the Operations Centre received the 2009 Award of Excellence from Canadian Architect magazine. This green facility consolidates a number of municipal services, reduces the carbon footprint and provides the necessary capacity to service the Town's \$1 billion worth of assets for the next 25 years and beyond. Geothermal heating, a green roof and storm water collection for irrigation are just a few of this facility's environmental features. This state-of-the-art facility will reduce energy use by 44 per cent and water usage by

40 per cent while also preventing over 400 tonnes of CO₂ from entering the environment each year.

Town takes top honours in Clean Air Commute Challenge

In 2010, Newmarket employees won the Pollution Probe Clean Air Commute Challenge, out of 67 participating organizations throughout the GTA. Taking part in this challenge enabled staff to reduce CO₂ emissions by approximately 95 kg in just one week - an amount that would take two newly planted trees approximately 10 years to convert back into oxygen. This challenge was facilitated by Smart Commute Central York, a program of the Newmarket Chamber of Commerce that helps organizations encourage their staff to bike, walk, carpool or use public transit to and from work.


The Town of Newmarket has been a proud partner and supporter of Smart Commute since its inception in 2007. Over the past five years, this program has reduced greenhouse gas emissions by 567,000 kg and saved commuters approximately \$1 million in travel expenses.

Honeywell retrofit program delivers sweet savings

In an effort to lower greenhouse gas emissions and utility costs, the Town of Newmarket partnered with Honeywell Canada to perform an audit and retrofit program of various municipal facilities. Since 2007, the approximate savings realized is over \$980,000. As a result of higher than anticipated energy savings, it is estimated that the Town will recover its initial investment in this program in just 7 years, rather than 10 years as originally estimated. A true win-win for the

bottom line and the environment, this program saves approximately 560 tonnes of CO₂ from entering the atmosphere each year. This is the equivalent of removing more than 80 cars from Newmarket's roads annually.

Newmarket branches out tree preservation efforts

Throughout 2011, approximately 800 trees were planted in Newmarket as part of the community's annual planting program. The Town has various tree preservation initiatives in place, including a street tree program, bylaws for the protection of woodlots, and a Tree Preservation, Protection, Replacement and Enhancement Policy. Newmarket's Official Plan outlines a target to increase the current level of tree cover of the entire Town from 9 to 12 per cent.

Newmarket turns off and takes a stand for Earth Hour

In 2011, for the fourth consecutive year,
Newmarket residents and businesses successfully
reduced electricity during the world-wide 'Earth
Hour' on March 26. In addition to encouraging
the community to participate in Earth Hour, the
Town led by example by turning off and reducing
lighting at various Town buildings and facilities.

With an overall reduction of approximately 5 per cent, Newmarket more than doubled the provincial average of 2 percent. As recorded by Newmarket-Tay Power Distribution, the electricity saved was the equivalent of taking approximately 1,900 homes completely off the grid for one hour.

Partnership for Climate Protection (PCP)

As an active member of the Partnership for Climate Protection program created by the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, Newmarket is well on its way to developing a community strategy for reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.

Newmarket is helping to be part of the solution by participating in this program, which is a performance-based model used to guide municipalities. The Town is in the process of completing two out of the five milestones, which include creating a GHG emissions inventory and developing a local action plan. A Town Committee has been established and in 2012 the Committee will continue to work toward completing additional milestones and implementing actions aimed at reducing GHG emissions.

Our Community

96 per cent of residents are satisfied with living in Newmarket

In 2010, Newmarket conducted a town-wide survey to gauge resident satisfaction with the municipality and its service levels. Out of almost 900 survey participants, 96 per cent were satisfied with living in Newmarket and nearly 80 per cent were satisfied with the services offered by the Town. As rated by residents, the top five services provided by the Town include: fire and emergency services, yard waste collection, interaction with the Customer Service Centre, garbage and recycling collection, and community special events. These results validate Newmarket's ongoing commitment to community satisfaction and customer service excellence. Newmarket has also been recognized by MoneySense magazine three years in a row as one of the 25 Best Places to Live in Canada.


Newmarket maps the way for culture

In 2011, Newmarket began seeking resident feedback on an important cultural mapping initiative that will result in an extensive database of cultural assets and will help shape future economic development in the community. This project is funded through the Creative Communities and Prosperity Fund through the Ministry of Tourism and Culture. The goal of cultural mapping is to identify and document all of the community's tangible cultural assets, such as arts and heritage organizations, cultural occupations and industries, as well as intangible cultural assets like stories and traditions that are unique to Newmarket. When completed, the cultural map will be available through an interactive mapping tool and will support cultural tourism and revenue opportunities.

Things will be great when you're downtown

As the famous song says, there's 'no finer place for sure'... this of course is referring to...downtown. Downtown Newmarket is no exception. It is a special gathering place where the old and new converge through a variety of shops, buildings and community spaces.

Identified as the centre for culture and entertainment in the Town's Cultural Master Plan, Newmarket invested millions of dollars in 2010 and 2011 to rejuvenate and revitalize Main Street and surrounding areas. As a key part of downtown revitalization, the Town offers various Financial Incentive Programs which generate 3.5 times the private sector investment for every municipal dollar invested.

With funding from the Provincial and Federal governments, the Town recently completed Newmarket Riverwalk Commons, renovated and expanded the existing Community Centre and approved the draft design to restore the historic Old Town Hall. These three major initiatives greatly enhance the downtown area and will continue to help drive cultural and economic development in the future.

Last fall, Newmarket residents, merchants and visitors gathered to celebrate the opening of Newmarket Riverwalk Commons, the community's newest landmark. This 8.4acre urban park includes a summer water feature that transforms to a winter skating rink, and an outdoor performance area for concerts, displays and community and cultural events.

The completion of the Riverwalk Commons represents an important missing link that connects the Town's entire trail system, uniting Newmarket with neighbouring communities and creating a beloved gathering place for Newmarketonians of all ages.

An integral part of this new landmark is the recently revitalized Newmarket Community Centre and Lions Hall. The Town partnered with the Newmarket Lions Club, an instrumental community group,

expenses of the renovations. The Community Centre is a cornerstone of the community, providing much-needed, year-round space for social, cultural and recreational activities.

Often referred to as the living room of the community, Newmarket's downtown has been significantly redecorated over the past couple of years. The makeover will continue in 2012 as work gets underway to revitalize the historic Old Town Hall.

The restoration of the Old Town Hall will make the building fully accessible and restore the historical landmark to its former glory. Renovations will include an updated theatre with 250 removable seats and a glass addition to preserve the heritage value and character of the building. The newly refreshed Old Town Hall will be the crowning jewel of the downtown and will play a key role in creating a vibrant and

Newmarket launches trail guide

The Town of Newmarket recently released an award-winning trail guide highlighting the community's more than 44 kilometres of walking and biking trails. In 2011, the final link was completed in Newmarket's Tom Taylor Trail, linking Newmarket to neighbouring communities. As part of the Nokiidaa trail system, which stretches more than 20 kilometres from Aurora to Holland Landing, the Tom Taylor Trail is a convenient link to many of the Town's parks and green spaces. Newmarket's vast trail system promotes a healthy lifestyle, reduces vehicle emissions by encouraging walking and cycling and brings the community together to enjoy the great outdoors. Newmarket is a social butterfly

Recognized by the Association of Municipalities of Ontario as a best practice in municipal social media, Newmarket has joined the cyber world and is utilizing a variety of social media forums to interact and connect with residents. Social media are some of the most effective and economical tools for communications. With approximately 1,500 Twitter followers, 10,000 views on the Town's YouTube channel and two million impressions on a recent Facebook survey,

social media have become staples in how the Town communicates and does business. The Town's most viewed YouTube video, GLOW, is an employment branding video that highlights various Town staff members and the impact they have on the community in various ways. The Town has also created videos for various other municipal events and activities including the opening of Newmarket Riverwalk Commons, the Holland River Clean-up and Earth Hour. All of Newmarket's YouTube videos were created utilizing student expertise from Ryerson University with minimal cost and resources. Newmarket also has a presence on FLICKR and issues a number of electronic newsletters, including Newmarket Now and the Downtown Dish.

Newmarket plants the seeds for community gardens

In spring 2011, in collaboration with the York Region Food Network, Newmarket opened its first community garden for the growing season. Located on Mulock Drive, Newmarket's community garden is composed of 65 plots and each plot donates a portion of the harvest to the local food bank. The Town works closely with volunteers and local community groups to prepare, plant and maintain the gardens.

Government to government everyone wins

In 2011, Newmarket partnered with its neighbours in northern York Region, known as the N6 (Aurora, East Gwillimbury, Georgina, Newmarket, King and Whitchurch-Stouffville), to save \$750,000 on joint insurance premiums. The N6 have worked together closely in recent years to look for innovative and collaborative ways to reduce costs and realize efficiencies. In 2006, the N6 joined forces on a joint garbage collection contract which saved \$11 million over 10 years.

Newmarket teams up with SunEdison for a greener planet and a better future

Newmarket recently welcomed SunEdison, North America's largest solar energy provider, to the community. SunEdison is producing its first Canadian-made solar panels in Newmarket. Newmarket was selected as the community of choice based on a shared commitment to environmental sustainability, access to a skilled workforce, affordability, and the supportive and responsive nature of the municipality. The addition of SunEdison to Newmarket's business community aligns perfectly with the Town's Economic Development Strategy. The result is the creation of 400 homegrown jobs. The Town has also partnered with SunEdison to have

solar panels installed on designated municipal facilities. This solar panel sustainability program will allow the Town to continue to generate green jobs, deliver clean green energy and contribute to the financial sustainability of the community.

Better Together: Building a bright future through partnerships

Much of Newmarket's success is based on the strong partnerships that have been created both within the community and beyond our borders.

One of the best examples of a successful partnership is the Newmarket Economic Development Advisory Committee (NEDAC) Since 2007, the Town of Newmarket has worked closely with a key group of business professionals in the community. NEDAC has offered invaluable advice and support and was integral in helping to shape the Town's Economic Development Strategy.

Moving forward, much of the Economic Development Strategy will largely be shaped by the health and knowledge sectors.



This is in no small part due to the success of Southlake Regional Health Centre (Southlake). Once a modest community hospital, Southlake is now one of the most modern and progressive health care facilities in the country. Southlake will not only play a vital role in the quality of care provided to the community, but in the economic future as well. The Economic Development Strategy outlines the potential to create 1,200 – 1,400 new jobs at Southlake.

A joint partnership with Southlake was one of the initiatives that recently put Newmarket on the world stage, by attracting delegations from Finland and Italy to our community.

In addition to Southlake, Newmarket has a number of strategic partnerships with community groups, organizations and other levels of government that ensure we are well positioned for the future. Two important ventures currently underway will greatly enhance the community's technological capabilities, including the Shared Digital Infrastructure (SDI) Project and the i-Canada Declaration.


The SDI Project created partnerships between the Town, the Newmarket Public Library, Southlake, the Chamber of Commerce and Newmarket-Tay Power. These partnerships will continue as the Town moves towards developing a potential broadband strategy.

Southlake Regional Health Centre

Through similar collaborations, Newmarket will seek opportunities to help enhance, upgrade and integrate the Town's technological infrastructure. This will ultimately increase economic development opportunities by attracting new talent and investment to the community in order to create a 21st-century knowledge-based economy.

In line with SDI is the Town's commitment to the i-Canada Declaration. Newmarket has joined forces with municipalities across the country to support and encourage this initiative. The goal is to ensure that Newmarket becomes an intelligent community and that Canada becomes one of the world's leaders in the global technological movement by 2020.

Whether it's working with the members of the community, neighbouring municipalities or communities from across the nation or around the globe, Newmarket will continue to embrace the `Better Together' philosophy and create partnerships that will continue to make this community one of the best places to live in Canada.



The Best is yet to come: Newmarket Now, **Newmarket Next**

Something big is happening in Newmarket. Right now, a rapid transit system that will completely transform public transit in the community is beginning to take shape. The vivaNext rapid transit system will have the largest impact on transportation in Newmarket since the arrival of the railroad.

This is no ordinary construction project. In 2010, 21 buildings along Davis Drive were removed in preparation for the construction of vivaNext. The Town of Newmarket worked closely with Viva and organizations like Habitat for Humanity to ensure that 85 per cent of building materials from the buildings removed were reused, recycled and diverted from landfill.

Our Future

In 2011, preparation and pre-construction continued to prepare Davis Drive for dedicated rapid transit lanes. Work commenced on reconstruction of the Keith Bridge. Working closely with the Town's Heritage Committee, the renovated Keith Bridge will reflect the community's rich architectural heritage and will be a testament to the history of transportation in Newmarket, through public art along the bridge.

Road widening is scheduled to begin in 2012 with an estimated completion date of 2014. This long-term vision will not only provide a safe, convenient alternative to driving, it will also completely transform Davis Drive. Urban design elements such as pedestrian-friendly boulevards and green, open space will ensure that this area becomes an inviting environment for new development. Over time, Davis Drive will be redefined as an attractive urban destination to work, dine, relax, live and shop.

Weaving the fabric of a liveable community

All towns and cities have their own unique tapestry. What gives a place its character is a combination of history, heritage, landmarks, culture and people. What makes a place liveable includes a number of factors related to the natural and built environment, transportation, art and strategic planning.

A liveable city is a place where trails and pedestrian facilities connect the entire community. An ecologically, socially and financially sustainable place where big city conveniences and small town charm intertwine. A dynamic, walkable, family-friendly location, with unending options for things to do, including shopping, dining, recreational activities, festivals and events. Just like a puzzle, all of the pieces are starting to fall into place for Newmarket as we strive towards being a truly liveable community.

With a number of tools already in place, including the Official Plan, the Economic Development Strategy and the Cultural Master Plan, Newmarket has a roadmap that will ensure future vitality, prosperity and liveability.

With the vivaNext rapid transit system established, it will allow for further intensification in the Town's urban corridors, which include:

- Yonge-Davis Provincial Urban Growth Centre
- The Yonge Street Regional Centre and
- The Regional Healthcare Centre

By concentrating growth in designated areas, it will protect the integrity of the Town's fabric. Pockets of urban amenities will be interwoven among existing neighbourhoods and green spaces. Shaped by the Town's Secondary Plan, over the next 30 years, these urban centres will evolve into vibrant, thriving, safe, walkable areas filled with outdoor cafes, restaurants and public artwork. Diverse and rich in culture, these pockets will accommodate 60 to 250 people and jobs per hectare.

The recently completed Riverwalk Commons, the weekly Farmers' Market, historic Main Street and a trail system that spans the entire community from north to south, are just a few of the pieces that are already in place in Newmarket's Liveable Community puzzle. The next key piece will be the revitalization of the Old Town Hall.

The Town will continue to focus on the Renewing Newmarket initiative which is about taking an extraordinary community and making it even better. Like a quilt, Newmarket's fabric will be colourful and unique. Each aspect will be equally important, weaving together a balance of big and small, city and country, old and new.



Message from the Treasurer

The Town of Newmarket is a diverse and complex organization. Our services range from putting out fires to constructing watermains, from ploughing the snow to providing hundreds of recreational events and programs each year.

It is a \$569 million business with approximately \$100 million in annual revenues.

We deliver service excellence to our residents and make Newmarket one of the best places to live in Canada. We provide quality programs and services to maintain a high level of community satisfaction – 96 per cent in the latest community survey. We make strategic community investments, which in 2011 included the Newmarket Riverwalk Commons and the new consolidated Operations Centre. We take steps to ensure long-term financial sustainability.

Last year, these steps included initiating a Service Review Program, building reserves to meet future infrastructure needs, and 6-year financial plans for our water and wastewater services.

We also need to consider global financial uncertainty. With this in mind, we preserve a responsible and affordable tax levy that responds to current and future needs. Newmarket has maintained a competitive tax rate by promoting efficiency and seeking innovative alternative revenue sources. The goal is to reduce our dependency on the property tax levy which currently provides 45 per cent of the Town's revenues.

Moving forward, for us to succeed at all of this, we will continue to increase our public consultation and engagement within the community. There is a two-pronged approach to this.

First, there will be more opportunities for our residents to become involved in the 2013 budget process. We will continue to build on our successes of the past and explore some exciting new ideas.

Second, my goal is to make the Treasurer and the Finance department more approachable – an attempt to humanize the bean counters.

And, as always, we look forward to your feedback.
